Helping Hungry Heroes

The Grand River Agricultural Society (GRAS) is proud to share that the community campaign **Helping Hungry Heroes** executed in May 2020, exceeded \$33,000 in donations.

The original intent of the campaign was to help provide meals to health care and front line workers in Centre Wellington, while also supporting local businesses. By the end of the campaign the program had supported over 40 different restaurants that were open to provide take out options to the community.



The starting goal was to provide gift cards to Groves Hospital, Wellington Terrace and EMT; however due to overwhelming support and pass it forward kindness the project also provided gift cards to the Centre Wellington Food Bank, Social Services, Wellington Place Child Care and Learning, Highland Manor Retirement Lodge, Caressant Care Fergus Nursing and Retirement Home and Heritage River Retirement Home.



Fergie's Fine Foods, A&W Fergus, Spanky's BBQ & Catering, Tandoori Table and Something Fishee were also looking for a way to support the community and matched or increased the purchased gift cards in-kind.

In addition to the \$25,000 of initial funding provided by GRAS, Rotary Club of Fergus-Elora, Fergus and District Kinsmen, OSSTF District 18 ESSP/ECE, Dan Allen Financial and many individuals all made cash donations to the campaign.

Drive-In Movie Nights

We hosted two Drive-In style movie nights in the parking lot on July 18th and August 22nd. Individuals pre-registered and paid online. There were just over 40 cars at each event.

These events were held because we wanted to provide the opportunity for people in our community to get out for a night, since there weren't many events due to the pandemic. We received a lot of positive feedback from both nights!

Food Truck Tuesdays

From June 15th - September 1st, we hosted a "Food Truck Night" every Tuesday. We had Spanky's BBQ - our permanent food truck during the summer - plus one other local truck for the first half of the summer due to Public Health regulations. After Stage 3 was announced, we were then able to have Spanky's plus two other local trucks. This was a great way for us to help promote the "shop local" initiative within our community. There was an average of 100+ people each night.

For the last few years we have been the location of the Centre Wellington Chamber of Commerce's Awards of Excellence Gala, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic they were not allowed to host an indoor event in 2020. The team at CWCC still wanted to host their event, so we pivoted the 'gala' to an outdoor Drive-In style event in our large parking lot. The event was still a huge success with approx. 80 vehicles in attendance.

Community Impact Stories

Guelph Humane Society \$10,000

GRAS funding supported our purpose-built space in our new home and helps GHS provide ongoing best practice sheltering to farm animals in care. Our new facility incorporates more indoor/outdoor space, improved lighting and better ventilation, which results in less stress for animals in our care. Our previous facility was cramped and did not reflect the work that we do in our community. It did not have a dedicated farm animal space. Small pens needed to be temporarily constructed and frequently moved within spaces designed for other purposes.



It was not uncommon for our education/large staff office to also house a chicken/duck pen. Our previous facility was also challenging since it did not have a temporary holding area for farm animals awaiting transfer to our partner north of Guelph or to foster. Our new facility has a flexible holding area and a treatment area that provides ongoing benefits to all our animals.



Our farm animal program is essential in our community. GHS services Wellington County which is predominantly rural. We also service the City of Guelph which allows hens to be housed on residential properties. Our service area requires a program model that is unique and diverse to address the needs in our community. Our farm space and program not only provides care to stray and surrendered companion farm animals, it also supports owners who are accessing one of our GHS Cares programs such as Pets in Transition and Emergency Boarding.

We experienced immediate positive impact of GRAS funding. 10 days after we moved into our new location, early March 2021, we welcomed our first farm animal: Jamie the hen. Jamie was also our Early Bird Draw mascot for our first online lottery. Jamie has since been adopted and is enjoying her HappyTail.

Elora Skatepark \$1,500

Thanks to the \$1,500 GRAS grant, we were able to plant 80mm caliper Pyramidal Oak trees at the Skatepark in Elora and they look fantastic! Up until these trees were planted the space was looking forgotten and sad unless community members were there, but now the space looks like it is alive and thriving.

Often when projects like this are built, it is the landscaping that cements the project into place giving it a sense of community and thoughtful placement. It is with this that your funding money for this makes this area a success.

awareness across the province.

The GRAS funding meant so much to our organization because we were able to realize the full potential of some of our poorly lit areas. Without this generous funding from GRAS, we would not have attempted this major infrastructure project. And because we now have three additional hydro poles of a much greater height, we are finally able to provide WiFi coverage to the entire fairgrounds. With the WiFi upgrades, we can now use computerized entry forms and show results will be available much sooner.

The Erin Agricultural Society is unique to other fairs in Wellington County as we own our own property. So, for many years, our twenty-five acre fairgrounds has been under-serviced in respect to electricity and proper lighting.

Now, we have been able to upgrade our electrical power on our fairgrounds, change the lighting at our track to energy efficient LED fixtures, remove old pole towers and install six new, energy efficient light poles with photo control and outlets at our gates. These updates will allow our gate attendants to have sufficient lighting in the evenings and enhance the security and safety on our property.

AgScape **\$15,000**

Connecting in a Virtual Education Environment In September 2020, schools across Ontario entered a new virtual learning environment. Zoom, Google Meets and YouTube became spaces where AgScape had to become versatile as teachers, to meet a surging demand for interactive and digital resources. Online became the new reality, a reality that AgScape embraced with help from the Grand River Agricultural Society's (GRAS) philanthropic funding and our shared goals for supporting agriculture engagement and

The move to virtual education has been both a challenge and an opportunity in that AgScape had to reenvision our programs very quickly but it has also allowed us to connect with a wider audience, including new school boards in previously underserved areas. Over the last year, conversations about food security, supply chain, shortage of labour and more have been brought to the forefront and having GRAS's support to develop programs and resources in a timely fashion has helped achieve a greater impact with our educators and students in making them aware of these important topics.



It has also allowed us to find new ways to work with industry partners to share knowledge not only within the education environment, but ways in which everyone can successfully navigate a new virtual educational landscape.

Thanks to GRAS we were able to pivot quickly in taking on this new digital landscape, continuing to offer our programs free of charge, and building the reach of agriculture education to students, teachers, and agricultural societies throughout Ontario.

Horse Racing at The Grand River Raceway



For the 48 date meet, total wagering on Grand River Raceway (GRR) live racing was \$12,953,560 for a daily average of \$269,866. During the same period in 2019, 48 race dates were conducted, \$10,382,493 was wagered, with a daily average of \$216,301. The total wager was up 25% over last season. A total of 489 races were conducted this year, 1 less than the same period last year. Ontrack wagering at GRR was \$69,995, or \$2,692 per card once customers were permitted onsite.

The site had been closed to customers, opening to up to 100 pre-registered guests outside since July 27th.

The main building was closed for the meet, and the Lighthouse Restaurant was closed due to construction. Onsite wagering for the fiscal year was \$177,073. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, wagering took place at the site from late July until the end of September on live race dates only, and from March 24th to March 31st of 2021.

Scott Coulter won the title as the leading driver at Grand River Raceway. The Brantford, ON resident won 47 races in 271 starts. A long time participant at Grand River Raceway, Coulter has over 5,300 victories and in excess of \$35 million in purse earnings throughout a career that began in 1995.

Trainer Richard Moreau recorded 17 wins and trained horses to purse earnings of \$112,396 to win the dash title in 2020. During the summer Moreau eclipsed 6,000 wins and \$60 million in career purse earnings. He has been named Canada's Trainer of the Year in each of the last seven years.



The \$200,964 Battle of Waterloo was won by Bettor Sun, driver Doug McNair, and trainer Gregg McNair. The Sunshine Beach colt is owned by breeder Willow Oak Ranch of Rogersville, Tennessee. The victory was the 4th for the McNairs in GRR's signature race.



Scarlett Hanover and Ed Hensley left from the second tier and carved out a solid pocket trip to take the \$128,149 Battle Of The Belles final in a new stakes record of 1:54.3. Ashleigh Hensley trains the Bettors Delight daughter, for owners Burke Racing Stable, Frank Baldachino, Jandt Silva Purnel & Libb, and Weaver Bruscemi LLC.
